Fire and Water -- From the Desk of the President...

Dear Members and Friends,

As the recent fire at Notre Dame Cathedral highlights, historic buildings are no stranger to fire damage and



destruction. According to a recent article in Time magazine there have been many historic buildings which have fallen victim to fire devastation, some just in the last 30 years. These include the nineteenth century National Museum of Rio de Janeiro, Brazil (2018), the eleventh century Windsor Castle in England (1992), the eighteenth century Slane Castle in Ireland (1991), and of course, the recent rampaging fire at Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris (2019).

Fire prevention and suppression have long been on the minds of the Trustees of the Foundation. Several steps have been, and are being taken to address the potential fire danger. An upgraded lightning rod system has been installed to protect against potential lightning strikes, a major source of building fires. Another common source of fire is an aging electrical system. In 2018 a multi-year project to upgrade the electrical system in the Meetinghouse was completed. And to insure early fire detection, a state of the art fire detection system was installed in 2018, replacing the older, less reliable alarm system.

With these major prevention and detection measures completed, the Board of Trustees turned its attention to fire suppression. As you may know, there is no town water system, and thus no fire hydrants in West Barnstable Village. In the event of fire at the Meetinghouse, the West Barnstable Fire Department relies on a 20,000 gallon water tank buried under the green, just below the Meetinghouse, as a major water source to extinguish a fire. This metal tank was placed there in the 1980's and is aging, thus impacting its long term viability.

To address this deficiency, the Board of Trustees is undertaking a major project to replace, or at minimum, supplement the water tank buried in the green. The location and size are significant as the tank must be easily accessible by the fire department, and be large enough to hold sufficient water to suppress a fire. It must also be buried so that it does not impact the view of the Meetinghouse. As you can imagine, a project of this size and scope requires expertise. The Board sought that expertise, and has hired the Horsley Witten Group, local engineering experts in this field, to determine the best location and design of the water tank, as well as provide construction plans and assist with necessary permits for the selected location.

The Board of Trustees would like to complete this project by 2020. However, much remains to be accomplished and as always with major projects, unknowns could impact the timeline. Watch for updates in coming newsletters.
